Turning Your Phone On and Off

Turning Your Phone On

1. Open the flip, then press

Note: As with any other radio-transmitting device, do not touch the internal antenna as it affects call quality and may cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than is necessary. The internal antenna is located along the top on the back side of your phone.

- Once the phone finds a signal, the time, date, and day appear in the display.
- 3. You're now ready to place and receive calls.

Note: If the phone is outside the Verizon Wireless coverage area the roaming icon ____ appears in the top of the display.

Turn Your Phone Off

Press for two or more seconds. Your phone powers off.

Setting Up Voicemail

Voicemail allows callers to leave voice messages, which can be retrieved any time.

Note: Once your voicemail account has been set up, you can use the Voicemail selection 6 (under the Messaging menu) to view details of voice messages in your voicemail box.

Voicemail Setup*

- 1. In idle mode, press and hold the 1 () key or dial *86 () beyond the 1 () key or dial your wireless phone number from any touch-tone phone.
- When the recorded announcement begins, press # () to interrupt (if applicable).
- An easy-to-follow setup tutorial will begin. Follow the instructions to set up your new password and record a greeting.

Listen to Voicemail

- 1. In idle mode, press and hold the 1 () key or dial *86 () by the second of the sec
- 2. You are then prompted to enter your password followed by # () key.
- Follow the recorded prompts to listen to messages, change administrative options, and so on.

Open View of Your Phone

The following illustration shows the main internal features of your phone:



Important: When opening the phone in Portrait Mode or Landscape Mode, it is important that you open the phone straight up (90 degrees). Opening the phone partially in Landscape Mode and then trying to open the phone in Portrait Mode may cuase damage to the hinge of the phone.

Features

- 1. Internal LCD: Displays all the information needed to operate your phone.
- 2. OK Key: Pressing when navigating through a menu accepts the highlighted choice in a menu.
- 3. Left Soft Key: This key is used to navigate through menus and applications by selecting the choice available in the Left Soft key Option.
- 4. Send Kev: Allows you to place or receive a call. In idle mode, press the key once to access the recent call log.
- 5. Camera/Camcorder Key: This key allows you to activate the camera. Press and hold to activate the camcorder.
- 6. Voice Recognition Key: Press to activate VoiceSignal.
- 7. Special Function Keys: Enters special characters. Perform various functions
- 8. **Microphone**: The Microphone allows the other caller to hear you clearly when you are speaking to them.
- 9. Alpha-numeric Keypad: Use these keys to enter numbers, letters, and characters.
- 10. Clear Key: Deletes characters from the display when you are in text entry mode. Press to return to the previous menu or screen when navigating features on your phone.
- 11. End Key: Ends a call. If you press and hold the END key, the power goes On or Off. When you receive an incoming call, press to ignore the call and send the call to voicemail.
- 12. Right Soft Key: This key is used to navigate through menus and applications by selecting the choice available in the Right Soft key Option.
- 13. Navigation Kevs: These kevs allow you to scroll through the phone menu options.
- 14. Speaker (Left): Music. Ringtones, and Sounds are played through the speaker. This speaker provides stereo sound for multimedia files by acting as a left stereo speaker.
- 15. Earpiece-Speaker (Right): The earpiece allows you to hear the other caller while in Portrait mode. When the phone is in a landscape orientation. this speaker provides stereo sound for multimedia files by acting as a right stereo speaker.

Closed View of Your Phone

The following illustration shows the main external features of your phone:



Features

- Power/Accessory Connector: The power/accessory interface connector is used to plug in the charging accessories and also connect any available accessory cables to your phone. This connector also allows you to plug in an optional headset for safe, convenient conversations.
- 3. Volume Keys: Allows you to adjust the master volume in idle mode (with the flip open) or adjust the voice volume during a call. To mute the ringer during an incoming call, press the volume key up or down. When the flip is closed, press and hold the key, and sub LCD displays.
- External LCD: External LCD shows signal and battery strength, time, day, and date. It also displays incoming calls or messages.
- 5. Rewind Kev: Music rewind kev.
- 6. Play/Pause Key: Music play or pause key.
- 7. Fast Forward Key: Music fast forward key.
- Speakerphone Key: Press this key to enable/disable the speakerphone option.

- microSD™ Card Slot: This expansion slot allows you to insert a microSD™ memory card to add additional memory and storage capacity.
- 10. Flash: The built-in flash has manual and automatic capabilities.
- 11. Camera Lens: Allows you to take photos or shoot video.

Command Keys

Functions for the soft keys are defined by what appears above each in the display. There are two soft keys, the left soft key and the right soft key .

Left Soft Key

Some functions of the left soft key are as follows.

- In idle mode, press the Message (left) soft key to open the Message menu.
- When the left soft key function is Settings, press the Settings (left) soft key
 to view settings for the feature.
- When the left soft key function is Edit, press the Edit (left) soft key to edit a Contact or Profile setting.

Right Soft Key

Some functions of the right soft key are as follows.

- In idle mode, press the Contacts (right) soft key to open your Contacts list.
- When the right soft key function is Options, press the Options (right) soft key
 to view more options for the current menu.

Clear Key

The **CLR** key **CLR** is used to erase or clear numbers, text, or symbols from the display. You can also use **CLR** to return to a previous menu or to return to idle mode from any menu.

- If you enter an incorrect character, briefly press to backspace (and delete) the character.
- To erase the previous word in a sentence, press and hold CLR.
- To back up one menu level, briefly press **CLR**.
- To return to idle mode from any menu, press and hold .

End Key

- Press and hold the End key to turn your phone on or off.
- Briefly press once to disconnect a call.
- Press to return to idle mode from any menu, or to cancel the last input.

Send Key

The **Send** key **SETU** is used to answer calls, dial calls, and to recall the last number(s) dialed, received, or missed.

- Press note to answer calls.
- Enter a number and briefly press **SEND** to make a call.
- Press STATE in idle mode to display a list of recent calls to and from your phone.
- Press state twice in idle mode to call the most recently dialed, received, or missed number.
- Press The to pick up a waiting call. Press again to switch back to the other call

Navigation Key

Use the directional keys on the navigation key to browse menus, sub-menus, and lists. Each key also acts as a shortcut to launch applications. The navigation key can be customized to launch your favorite application. See "Set Shortcut Key" on page 86 for more information.

Hold Kev

Press the **Hold** key (■■■) to lock/unlock the touch pad (i.e. ■■ Rewind, ■ ■ Play/Pause, and ■■■ Fast Forward) on the front of the u740.

Note: The music touch keys are only functional when the backlight is on.

Speakerphone Key

Press the **Speakerphone** key () to switch from using the earpiece to the speakerphone before or during a call. Use the volume keys (located on the left side of your phone) adjust the volume. Press the speakerphone key to enable and disable the speakerphone option.

The following functions are only applicable in **Landscape** mode.

For more information on Landscape mode, refer to "Section 11: Landscape Mode" on page 122.

NumLock Key

Press in landscape mode to lock/unlock text entry 123.

Shift Key

Press in landscape mode to cycle between upper case (ABC), lower case (abc), or initial caps (Abc) for characters in **ABC** mode

Fn Kev

Press in landscape mode to dial vanity numbers. For example to dial 1-800-SAMSUNG, enter the number 1-800 using the gray numeric keys. Then press and use the QWERTY keyboard to enter SAMSUNG and press

Enter Key

Press **Enter** in landscape mode to move the insertion point to the next line in a message. When in the main menu screen, press to access menus and sub-menu items.

Spacebar Key

Press the **Spacebar** (in landscape mode to insert spaces between words or characters.

Understanding the Display Screen

The top line of your phone's display contain icons that indicate network status, battery power, signal strength, connection type and more.



The light blue line of the idle screen shows icons that indicate feature and function status. The following list contains icons that may appear in your display.

Display icons

- Signal Strength: Always appears when your phone is on and indicates the current signal strength. More bars indicate a stronger signal.
- Standalone Mode: Appears when Standalone Mode is on. When on, all RF functions for your phone are disabled, and you cannot use your phone to place or receive calls.
- Roaming Indicator: Your phone is outside your home area. While roaming, another wireless provider may be handling your call. The service rate for the call may be higher than those made from within your home area. Please refer to Verizon Wireless for roaming rates.
- **Digital**: Appears when your phone is receiving digital data.
- 1X Protocol: Indicates your phone is using the CDMA 1X protocol.
- **EVDO**: Appears when your phone is using the EVDO protocol.
- **EVDO/1X**: The EVDO/1X protocol is capable of high-speed broadband data (3G).
- **EVDO/2G**: Indicates your phone is using the EVDO 2G protocol.
- SSL: Indicates the secure socket layer is active transmits your communications over the internet in an encrypted format.
- **P Voice Privacy**: Prevents eavesdropping over a CDMA traffic channel.
- No service indicator: Your phone cannot find a signal because you're outside a service area. You cannot make or receive calls. Wait for a signal or move to an open area to find a signal. This indicator always appears when you first turn on your phone and disappears once service is located.
- Dormant: Indicates no incoming or outgoing data.
- Voice Call: Indicates a call in progress. When dialing a number, this icon flashes until the call connects.

- Data Call: Indicates a call in progress. When dialing a number, this icon flashes until the call connects.
- E911: Global Positioning Service (GPS) for 911 is set to On for emergency calls only.
- Location On: Global Positioning Service is set to On for location and 911 calls.
- **Bluetooth**: Indicates that Bluetooth wireless technology is active.
- Bluetooth Active: Indicates that Bluetooth wireless technology is connected and receiving or pushing data.
- Bluetooth Connected: Indicates Bluetooth wireless technology is active and connected.
 - Dial ABC Lock: Indicates that letter entry is active in the dialing screen. Pressing the Fn key while dialing toggles this lock. (eg. Allows dialing the letters "SAMSUNG" in "1-555-SAMSUNG".
 - Number Lock: Indicates NumLock is active. The NumLock Key changes
 Text Entry Mode from Abc to 123. The NumLock icon only displays
 when using the Verizon Wireless Mobile Web.
 - Hold Keys Lock: Indicates that music player keys are locked and are not functional. Press again to unlock the music player keys.
- Battery Level: More bars indicate a greater charge. When the battery is low, an empty battery icon flashes and the phone sounds an alert, which indicates your phone is about to shut down.
- TTY: Indicates that TTY is enabled.
- All Sounds Off: The ringer is silenced for all alerts, incoming calls, and incoming messages.
- Alarm Only: Your phone will only ring when the set alarm sounds.
- Vibrate Only: Your phone vibrates upon receiving a call.
- Speakerphone: Your phone switches to speakerphone instead of earpiece.

- Missed Calls: Your phone displays this icon when calls are missed.
- Message: You've received a new text, page or web alert message. You're also notified of a new message by animations and sound.
- Calendar Appointment: Your phone displays this icon when you have a calendar appointment scheduled.
- Voicemail: You've received a voicemail message, page or web alert message. You have one or more unread voicemail messages in your voicemail box. (Only applicable on the Verizon Wireless Network.)
- Alarm On: Indicates that your phone has a set alarm.
- Auto Answer: Automatic answer is enabled. Your phone automatically picks up calls after the designated time with the stereo headset or when your bluetooth headset or bluetooth hands-free car kit is connected.

Dialogue boxes

Dialogue boxes prompt for action, inform you of status, or warn of situations such as low memory. Dialogue boxes and their definitions are outlined below.

- Choice
 - Example: "SAVE MESSAGE DRAFT?"
- Reconfirm
 - Example: "ERASE ALL MESSAGES?"
- Performing
 - Example: "SENDING..." "CONNECTING.."
- Completed
 - Example: "MESSAGE SENT!"
- Information
 - Example: "NEW MESSAGE"
- Error
 - Example: "SYSTEM ERROR!"
- Warning
 - Example: "BATTERY LOW," "MEMORY FULL!"

Battery

Note: This phone comes packaged with a partially charged rechargeable standard Li-lon battery and travel charger.

Important: Although the phone can be used while the battery is charging, the battery must be fully charged before first use, otherwise you could damage the battery.

Using A Non-Supported Battery

Samsung handsets do not support the use of a non-supported battery.

When using a non-supported battery you will hear a series of beeps and you will see a warning message that indicates "NON SUPPORTED BATTERY SEE USER **GUIDE**" If you receive this warning, battery charging has been disabled.

Samsung charging accessories (i.e. travel adapter, and cigarette lighter adapter) will only charge a Samsung approved battery.





Note: When using a non-supported battery the handset can only be used for the duration of the life of the battery and cannot be recharged.

Important: Using a non-supported battery may cause damage to your phone. Use a Samsung supported battery only.

Install the Battery

1. Slide the battery cover down and lift up to remove it.



Insert the top end of the battery into the phone housing by using the direction of the arrow printed on the battery. The gold contacts on the top of the battery should match up with those on the phone.



- 3. Push the bottom end of the battery down until it snaps into place.
- 4. Slide the battery cover up until it snaps into place.



Remove the Battery

1. Slide the battery cover down and lift up to remove it.



2. Use your finger to lift the battery (bottom end first) up and away from the phone.



Charge the Battery

Your phone is powered by a rechargeable standard Li-ion battery. Only use Samsung-approved charging devices and batteries. Samsung accessories are designed to maximize battery life. Using other accessories may invalidate your warranty and may cause damage.

Travel Charger

The travel charger is a convenient, light-weight charger that rapidly charges your phone from any 120/220 VAC outlet.

 Plug the large end of the travel charger into a standard 120/220 VAC wall outlet.



Insert the smaller end of the travel charger into the charger/ accessory connector on the left side of the phone.

Note: You can use your phone while charging, however, the battery charges faster if the phone is turned off.

Battery Indicator

The battery indicator •••• in the upper-right corner of the display indicates battery power level. Four bars indicate a full charge, while an empty icon — indicates an almost empty battery. Two to three minutes before the battery becomes too low to operate, a blinking empty battery icon — appears and a tone sounds. If you continue to operate the phone without charging, it shuts down.

Making a Call

- At the idle screen, enter the number you want to call using the gray numeric keypad.
- 2. Press III .

Note: In landscape mode, you can only make calls using the speakerphone.

 For more detailed procedures, refer to "Making a Call - Landscape Mode" on page 125.

Making Calls Using Contacts

Contacts are entries that you create to store names, numbers, and other information for people or groups of interest. If you've already entered information into your Contacts list, you can recall and dial the contact easily. See "Adding a Contact" on page 50 for information on creating contacts.

- 1. At the idle screen, press the right soft key **Contacts**.
- Press the navigation up and down keys until the contact that you want to call is highlighted.

Tip: To quickly locate a name, press (or multi-press) any key on the keypad that corresponds to the first, second, and/or third letters of the contact's name.

- When the desired contact is highlighted, press VIEW. Details for the contact appear in the display.
- If the entry contains more than one number, use the up or down navigation key to highlight the desired number.
- 5. Press to call the number.

In Landscape mode 🚟

Note: In landscape mode, you can only make calls using the speakerphone.

Answering a Call

When you receive an incoming call, press the key to answer the call or right soft key **[and the call to voice of t**

Answering Call-Waiting Calls

- When you receive a new call while on a call, press to answer the new call or let the new call go to your voicemail.
- If you press and answer the incoming call, the original caller is placed on hold. To return to your original call press

In-Use Menu Options

Access numerous menus and features even while in a call.

Note: If the call is disconnected while accessing the In-Use Option, the In-Use Option disappears from the display and the phone eventually returns to idle mode.

- While in a call, press the right soft key Options. The following menu items appear in the display.
 - · Messaging: Open the Messages menu.
 - · Contact List: Open the contacts to view.
 - Recent Calls: Displays your recent incoming, missed and outgoing calls.
 - Bluetooth Menu: Displays the Bluetooth menu.
 - Main Menu: Displays the Main menu.
 - Notepad: Displays the Notepad menu.
 - Voice Record: Record a voice memo.
- 2. Use the navigation key to highlight a menu. Press on to open the highlighted menu or to activate the feature.

Recent Calls

When you place, miss, or receive a call, a record of the call is saved in Recent Calls, which is a listing of the different types of calls you can either receive or make. These types of calls are listed below.

- . Missed: Displays any missed calls.
- Received: Displays any received calls that were answered.
- Dialed: Displays all outgoing calls made from your phone.
- All: Displays all missed, received, and outgoing calls made from your phone.

Viewing Call Information

Recent Calls retains information such as the duration, date and time, and whether the call was received, dialed, or missed.

- At the idle screen, press the key.
 Or press MENU then press the right navigation key to highlight freent Calls and press . Use the navigation key to select a category and press . Continue to step 3.
- Press the left or right navigation key to highlight the call log that contains the number you want to view and press
- 3. Press the down navigation key to highlight the desired number.
- Once the desired number is highlighted, press OPEN.
- 5. The following information appears in the display:
 - Call Type: The title bar displays if the call is a missed, dialed, or received.
 - Name: If the caller is in your Contacts list, their name is listed here. This option only appears if the caller is in your Contacts list.
 - Number: Displays the telephone number as well as the appropriate icon to indicate mobile, work, or home number.
 - Time: The time of the call.
 Date: The date of the call.
 - Duration: The duration of the calls made or receive.
- 6. Press the right soft key **Options** to display the following options:
 - · Save: Save the number to your Contacts list.
 - Details: Displays details about the caller if entered in Contacts.
 - · Erase: Delete the call from Call History.
 - · Lock/Unlock: locks or unlocks the entry to prevent accidental deletion.
 - Erase All: Delete all calls from Call History.
 - View Timers: Select to view the call timers for your phone.
- Press the down navigation key to highlight an option. Press to enter the highlighted option's sub-menu.

Call History Icons

When you view Recent Calls, an icon to the left of the number indicates the type of call.

Making Calls Using Call History

- At the idle screen, press then press up or down navigation key until the desired number is highlighted.
- Press to call the highlighted number. Or, you can press OPEN, then press to call the highlighted number.

Creating or Updating Contacts Using Call History

- At the idle screen, press then press up or down navigation key until the desired number is highlighted.
- 2. Press the right soft key **Options**. Save is highlighted. Press **.**

- Use the up or down navigation keys to highlight Create New Contact or Update Existing. Press
- 4. If you selected **Create New Contact**, the following types are available.
 - Mobile 1
 - IVIODIIC
 - Mobile 2
 - Home
 - Work
 - Fax
- 5. If you selected **Update Existing**, proceed to step 11.
- Use the up/down navigation keys to highlight the desired entry type (mobile, home, work, etc.) then press
- Enter a name for the entry using the keypad. Press the left soft key
 Abc if you wish to select a different method of text entry, such as Word,
 Abc, ABC, 123, or Symbols.

 To assign a Speed Dial location, use the up/down navigation key to highlight the number you would like to assign to a Speed Dial location and press the right soft key Options. Highlight Set Speed Dial and press .

Highlight an unassigned location and press SET. A confirmation message appears in the display, Yes is highlighted, press to add Contact to the speed dial location.

Note: Voicemail is assigned to Speed Dial location 1.

Note: You can assign a speed dial location to each number associated with the contact (Home, Work, Mobile 1, Mobile 2, and Fax.).

- When you're finished entering information for the entry, press SAVE.
 The entry is saved to your Contacts.
- 10. If you selected Update Existing, the Contact List opens in Search mode. Use the navigation key to browse through entries, or enter the name of the entry using the keypad. Once you've highlighted the entry you wish to add the number, press
- 11. An UPDATE EXISTING pop-up screen with a selection list of entry types displays. Use the up or down navigation keys to highlight the desired type then press . The number is added to the selected entry and saved to your Contacts.

Delete Call History Entries

- At the idle screen, press then press up or down navigation key until the desired number is highlighted.
- Press the right soft key Options. A pop-up menu appears in the display.
- 3. Press the down navigation key to highlight **Erase** and press . Select **Yes** or **No** at the **ERASE ENTRY?** pop-up screen.

Delete All Call History Entries

- 1. At the idle screen, press
- Press the right soft key Options. A pop-up menu appears in the display.
- Press the down navigation key to highlight Erase All and press . Select Yes or No at the ERASE ALL ENTRIES? pop-up screen.

Roaming

What is Roaming?

Your phone can roam on other digital networks. Roaming occurs when you travel outside a pre-designated coverage area. The roaming icon displays when roaming is active and extra charges may apply when making or receiving calls.

Note: Some features may be unavailable while roaming.

Roaming Options

The following roaming options are available:

- Home Only Your phone is available for normal operation only in the designated coverage area.
- Automatic: The preferred roaming list is used to acquire service.

Note: Contact your service provider for information regarding preferred systems.

To change your Roaming option, follow these steps:

- Press MENU. Use the right navigation key to highlight Settings & Tools and press
- 2. Press 6 (Phone Settings.
- 3. Press 7 (System Select.
- Use the up or down navigation keys to choose the setting you want, and press .

TTY

Your phone is fully TTY compatible. Connect the TTY equipment to the headset jack, which is located on the left side of the phone. Before you can use your phone with a TTY device, you'll need to enable TTY functions in the phone.

- Press MENU. Use the right navigation key to highlight Settings & Tools and press
- 2. Press 7 (Call Settings.
- 3. Press 3 (TTY Mode. The TTY Mode screen displays.
- 4. A warning appears in the display stating "ENABLING TTY WILL DISABLE HEADSET AUDIO. CONTINUE?"

Use the up or down navigation key to highlight **Yes** and press or proceed to TTY MODE screen.

Use the up or down navigaton key to highlight No and press on to return to Call Settings menu.

- 5. Use the up or down navigation keys to select one of the following:
 - TTY Full
 - TTY + Talk (VCO)
 - TTY + Hear (HCO)
 - TTY Off

VoiceSignal™

VoiceSignal is advanced speech recognition software that can be used to activate a wide variety of functions on your phone. VoiceSignal software automatically voice activates all contacts for voice dialing and searching, no pre-recording or training needed. Speak phone numbers naturally to dial, and use voice commands to launch applications and navigate phone menus.

VoiceSignal Settings

You can adjust the settings and preferences for VoiceSignal by opening Voice Commands menu. Using this menu, you can change the following Voice Command features:

To access the VoiceSignal Settings menu, follow these steps:

- At the idle screen, press MENU. Use the right navigation key to highlight Settings & Tools and press ...
- 2. Press 2 () Tools, then 1 () Voice Commands, and 2 () Voice Settings.
- 3. Use the navigation keys to select the setting you want to change. The following options are available:
 - Choice Lists: If VoiceSignal is not absolutely confident that it has correctly
 identified a name or number, it can display a choice list of up to three
 possibilities, and prompt you to confirm the correct one. You can control when
 choice lists appear by changing the Choice Lists setting to the following:
 - Automatic: VoiceSignal displays a choice list when it is not confident it has identified the correct choice from among multiple alternatives.
 - Always On: When there are multiple alternatives, VoiceSignal always displays a choice list.
 - Always Off: VoiceSignal never displays a choice list. Instead, the application picks the best from among the possible choices.
- Sensitivity: In VoiceSignal, sensitivity controls the balance between rejecting too much, which means the phone frequently does not recognize names, numbers, or commands, and rejecting too little, which means it frequently recognizes something even if nothing was said. When VoiceSignal rejects an utterance, it displays a message such as "Please repeat..." or "No match found." If you frequently experience these messages, you might be able to get better recognition by adjusting the Sensitivity setting toward Reject Less. If you frequently experience false activations (VoiceSignal detects a wrong match), you might be able to get better performance by adjusting the Sensitivity setting toward Reject More.
- Digit Dialing: Use the Digit Dialing menu to adapt digit dialing to your voice.
 - Adapt Digits: Lets you adapt digits, which can improve voice recognition of phone numbers. Adaptation takes about 180 seconds.
 - Reset Digits: Erases any digit adaptation you have done and resets digit recognition to the factory default. If you have not adapted digits, this option is grayed out.

- Sound: You can customize the VoiceSignal user interface by turning playback on or off for prompts, names, and numbers. You can also change the speed and volume of name playback.
 - Prompts: Turns playback on or off for prompts such as "Sav a command."
 - Digits: Turns playback on or off for digits, for example, when confirming a phone number
 - Names: Turns playback on or off for names.
 - Name Settings: Adjusts the speed and volume of name playback.
- VoiceMode: Lets you adapt words, which can improve voice recognition in the Picture messaging and Video messaging clients. See "Entering Text Using VoiceMode" on page 45, for detailed information.
 - Adapt VoiceMode: Lets you Adapt VoiceMode to your voice, which improves voice recognition of VoiceMode. You must use the adapt VoiceMode feature in a quiet room for best results.
 - Reset VoiceMode: Resets Voicemode to default setting.
 - Tutorial: Displays the VoiceMode tutorial.
- About: Displays information about VoiceSignal including version number, build number, and device number.

You can also access the VoiceSignal Settings menu by following these steps:

- 1. In idle mode, press the key.
- 2. Press the right soft key Settings.
- 3. Use the navigation keys to select the setting you want to change.

Adapting VoiceSignal

Voice dialing works well for most people without special adaptation. However, people with strong accents or unique voice characteristics may receive better results after adapting the system to match their voices.

You should adapt Digit Dial only if the system is frequently unable to recognize your speech. After you adapt Digit Dial, your phone is customized to your voice, and your voice only. Others will not be able to use it unless they reset the phone to factory defaults

Adaptation involves recording several digit sequences to adapt the system to the unique properties of your voice. The adaptation process takes about three minutes.

Tips for adapting Digit Dial

- · Adapt digits in a quiet place.
- Make sure you wait for the beep before starting to speak.
- Speak clearly, and say each digit distinctly.

- If you make a mistake while recording a sequence of digits, or if there is an
 unexpected noise that spoils the recording, re-record that sequence.
- Only adapt digits if you regularly have problems with digit dialing. Once adapted, digit dialing will not work as well for other people using your phone.
- · Adapt Digit Dial to your voice.

Digit Dial Adaptation

To access the Adapt Digits menu, follow these steps:

- At the idle screen, press MENU. Use the right navigation key to highlight Settings & Tools and press .
- 2. Press 2 (Tools, then 1 (Voice Commands.
- 3. Press 2 (Voice Settings, then 3 (Digit Dialing.
- 4. Adapt Digits is highlighted. Press
- $\textbf{5.} \ \ \textbf{A} \ \textbf{short description of the Adapt Digits displays}.$
- **6.** Read the description until you are comfortable to proceed, then press .
- Your phone displays the first digit sequence and "Please say" plays through the speaker followed by the four digits appearing in the display.
 - Wait for the beep and repeat the digits using your normal tone of voice.
- 8. After a moment, the phone plays back the recording and prompts "Did the recording sound ok?" If the recording was good, say "Yes." If you need to re-record, say "No."

- After confirming that the recording sounds ok, repeat the recording process with the next set of digits. After ten sets of digits, the phone indicates that adaptation is complete.

5. Press to proceed. Digit Adaptation Reset is completed.

- To use Digit Dialing, say the area code and number that you want to dial into the microphone, clearly and naturally.
- The number that you said is repeated through the earpiece and your phone dials the number.
- If VoiceSignal is not sure of the number that you said, a list of possible matches appears in the display.
- You're asked to confirm the correct number as VoiceSignal displays the results. Say "Yes" or "No" to confirm or reject the number when prompted.

Call Name Dialing

To use Name Dial, you'll need to have entries stored in your Contacts list. See page 50 for information on creating a Contacts list.

This section outlines how to select the desired text input mode when entering characters into your phone. This section also describes how to use the T9 predictive text entry system to reduce the amount of key strokes associated with entering text.

Changing the Text Entry Mode

- While composing a message in the Text area, press the right soft key
 Options to display the following options:
 - Save As Draft: Save the message to your Draft folder.
 - Add Graphic: Lists preloaded and downloaded graphics to add to the message.
 - Add Animation: Lists preloaded and downloaded animations to add to the message.
 - Add Sound: Lists preloaded and downloaded sounds to add to the message.
 - Add Quick Text: Choose from up to 12 pre-loaded messages. You can add 10
 additional messages by pressing the right soft key
 New and erase
 messages by pressing the left soft key
 - Add Name Card: Select from My Name Card or Contacts to add to the message.
 - Edit Text Format: Change font size, text alignment, style, background and color.
 - Priority Level: Save the message with a High or Normal priority.
 - Callback #: Provides the option to send a callback number with the message.
 - Enh. Delivery Ack: Displays a pop-up screen notifying the message sent has been received.
 - Cancel Message: Cancels the message and returns you to the New Message menu

- While composing a message, press left soft key Abc to display a pop-up menu with the following Text Entry Mode options:
 - VoiceMode
 - Word*
 - Abc
 - ABC
 - 123
 - Symbols

Note: *Word is only available in Portrait mode.

Entering Text Using VoiceMode

VoiceMode dictation software allows you to convert your speech to text when sending a Text or Picture-Video message. Combining VoiceMode with the Send Text, Send Picture and Send Video voice commands, you can address, compose, and send a text message using just your voice and a few keys.

Entering Text

- 1. In idle mode, press the left soft key Message, then press 1 (Message) New Message.
- 2. Press 1 () TXT Message, 2 () Picture Message, or 3 () Video Message.
- Enter the phone number or email address of the recipient, then press the down navigation key to move to the Text field.
- Press the left soft key Abc to display a pop-up menu containing text entry mode options.
- Abc is highlighted by default. Use the up/down navigation keys to highlight VoiceMode, then press . The text entry mode indicator changes from Abc to Voice.
- Press and hold Apop up "YOU NEED TO ADAPT VOICEMODE. ADAPT NOW?" screen displays.
- Yes is highlighted, press twice to Adapt VoiceMode. This will take about 3 minutes to complete.
- After Adapting VoiceMode is complete, then begin speaking your text slowly and clearly into the microphone to add text to your message.
- Release the key when you are finished speaking or to take a break. Press and hold when you are ready to resume speaking.

Tips for Text Entry Using VoiceMode

- Use VoiceMode in a quiet place.
- Make sure you press and hold the key before starting to speak.
- · Speak clearly, and say each word distinctly.
- · Pause for a second between each word.
- If you make a mistake or VoiceMode misunderstands you while dictating a message, complete the sentence or message, then correct any errors using the navigation and 0 () keys.

Correcting Errors

VoiceMode recognizes the most frequently used word that matches the word you spoke into the microphone. To correct a VoiceMode error, do the following:

- 1. Use the navigation keys to highlight the word to be changed.
- Press 0 () to display other words from the VoiceMode dictionary, if available, or to enter the correct word, if it is not in the dictionary.
- 3. Use the navigation keys to highlight the desired word, then press to enter the selected word in your message.

Entering Text Using Word Mode

Word recognizes the most commonly used word for any sequence of key presses and inserts that word into your message. It's much faster than the traditional method of text entry (Abc) and requires only one key press per letter of the word that you're spelling.

- In idle mode, press the left soft key Message, then press 1 () New Message, 1 () TXT Message to compose a new text message.
- Enter the phone number or email address of the recipient, then press the down navigation key to move to the Text field.
- Press the left soft key Abc to display a pop-up menu containing text entry mode options.
- Abc is highlighted by default. Use the up/down navigation keys to highlight Word, then press

Now, for practice, enter the word "Hello" into your message by pressing each of the following keys only once:



Word recognizes that the most frequently used word for the sequence of numbers entered. The word you just entered is "HELLO." If more than one word shares the same sequence, Word provides the most common of the two. Press **0** () to display other words in the dictionary, if available.

Entering Upper and Lower Case

- Enter characters while in ABC mode by pressing the key that contains the desired characters. Press 4 () for "G".
- Press the key repeatedly to cycle through other available characters for that key.
- Pause briefly when the desired character appears in the display to accept the character and therefore insert it into the message.
- Press # () to enter a space.
- To cycle between uppercase, lower case, and initial caps for characters in ABC mode, briefly press * (

In Landscape mode 🚟

- Enter characters while in ABC mode by using the QWERTY keyboard.
- Press the left soft key Abc to select a text entry option.
- Press to cycle between upper, lower case, or initial caps for characters in ABC mode.
- Press the **Spacebar** () to enter a space.

Entering Symbols

Symbol mode enables you to enter symbols such as @ or % into a text message.

In idle mode, press the left soft key Message, then press
 1 () New Message, 1 () TXT Message to compose a new text message.

- Enter the phone number or email address of the recipient, then press the down navigation key to move to the Text field.
- Press the left soft key Abc to display a pop-up menu containing the text entry mode options.
- Abc is highlighted by default. Use the up/down navigation keys to highlight Symbols, then press . The first of three screens containing symbols appears in the display.
- Press Prev or Next to page through the other symbols, if necessary.
- Enter the key that corresponds with the symbol that you wish to enter. For example, press 4 () for an exclamation point (!) on the first page of symbols.
- Repeat steps 3 through 6 to insert as many symbols into your message as desired

Entering Numbers

Enter numbers into a text message while in number mode (123). See "Changing the Text Entry Mode" on page 44 for instructions on changing text entry modes.

- In idle mode, press the left soft key Message, then press 1 (New Message, 1 (New Message to compose a new text message.
- Enter the phone number or email address of the recipient, then press the down navigation key to move to the Text field.
- Press the left soft key Abc to display a pop-up menu containing the text entry mode options.
- 4. Abc is highlighted by default. Use the up/down navigation keys to highlight 123, then press .
- Enter the key that corresponds with the number that you wish to enter. For example, press 4 () for the number 4.
- When you are finished adding numbers, press the left soft key 123 to select a different method of text entry or press SEND to send your message.

Opening Contacts Menu

The Contacts menu provides access to powerful features such as adding Groups, creating and sending V-cards, and viewing the phone number assigned to your phone by Verizon Wireless.

- In idle mode, press MENU, Contacts is highlighted, press .
 - · New Contact: Add a number, or e-mail address to your Contacts.
 - · Contact List: Find a phone number by Name.
 - Groups: Add new or rename one of your five default groups.
 - · Speed Dials: Set a speed dial for a contact.
 - My Name Card: Create a business card, which can then be sent to others as an attachment
- Use the navigation key to highlight the Contacts sub-menu of your choice, then press .

Contacts Icons

You can assign multiple entries to a contact. The icons in the following table represent all available entry types

- Mobile 1 icon. Enter a mobile number for the entry in this field.
- Home icon. Enter a home number for the entry in this field.
- Work icon. Enter the work number for the entry in this field.
- E-mail 1 icon. Enter an e-mail address for the entry in this field.
- Group icon. Select an available group to associate with the entry in this field.
- Picture icon. Select an available pre-loaded image or downloaded image from Picture ID to associate with the contact.
- Ringtone icon. Select a ringtone to associate with the entry in this field.
- Mobile 2 icon. Enter a secondary mobile number for the entry in this field
- Fax icon. Enter a fax number for the entry in this field.
- E-mail 2 icon. Enter a secondary e-mail address for the entry in this field.
- Notes icon. Enter a note for the entry in this field.

Adding a Contact

When you add information to your Contacts, you can add it as a new entry or as an existing entry.

Method 1

Storing a number from idle mode

- 1. In idle mode, press MENU, Contacts is highlighted, press .
- 2. Press 1 (New Contact to enter the contact information.
- 3. Enter a name for the entry using the keypad.
- Use the navigation key to highlight the appropriate type (Mobile, Home, Work, E-mail, etc.). Once highlighted, use the keypad to enter required information.

Use the navigation key to highlight other type fields, if desired. Enter information using the keypad.

5. To assign a Speed Dial location after entering the number, press the right soft key Options. Highlight Set Speed Dial and press . Highlight an unassigned location and press SET. A confirmation message appears in the display, Yes is highlighted, press to add the Contact to the speed dial location.

Note: Voicemail is assigned to Speed Dial location 1.

Note: You can assign a speed dial location to each number associated with the contact (Home, Work, Mobile 1, Mobile 2, and Fax.).

When you're finished entering information for the entry, press SAVE to save the entry to your Contacts.

Method 2

Storing a number from idle mode

You can add new numbers to the Contacts by simply entering the number while the phone is in idle mode, then following the necessary prompts to complete the process.

- In idle mode, enter the number that you wish to save using the keypad, then press the left soft key Save. You're prompted to select from Create New Contact or Update Existing.
- Press 1 () to enter the number as a Create New Contact, or press 2 () to add the number to Update Existing.

Note: Press 3 () to save the entry to Notepad.

- 3. If you selected **Create New Contact**, the following types are available.
 - Mobile 1
 - Mobile 2
 - 🛗 Home
 - Work
 - A Fax
- 4. If you selected **Update Existing**, proceed to Step 9.
- Use the up/down navigation keys to highlight the desired entry type (mobile, home, work, etc.) then press

- 6. Enter a name for the entry using the keypad. Press the left soft key Abc if you wish to select a different method of text entry, such as Word, Abc, ABC, 123, or Symbols.
- 7. To assign a Speed Dial location, use the up/down navigation key to highlight the number you would like to assign to a Speed Dial location and press the right soft key Options. Highlight Set Speed Dial and press

Highlight an unassigned location and press SET. A confirmation message appears in the display, Yes is highlighted, press to add Contact to the speed dial location.

Note: Voicemail is assigned to Speed Dial location 1.

Note: You can assign a speed dial location to each number associated with the contact (Home, Work, Mobile 1, Mobile 2, and Fax.).

- When you're finished entering information for the entry, press SAVE. The entry is saved to your Contacts.
- 9. If you selected Update Existing, the Contact List opens in Search mode. Use the navigation key to browse through entries, or enter the name of the entry using the keypad. Once you've highlighted the entry you wish to update, press
- 10. An UPDATE EXISTING pop-up screen with a selection list of entry types displays. Use the up or down navigation keys to highlight the desired type then press . The number is added to the selected entry and saved to your Contacts.

Method 3

Storing Numbers After a Call

Once you've finished a call, you can store the number of the caller to your Contact List.

Note: If the call was incoming and Caller ID information was unavailable, then the store option is also unavailable

 After you press to end your call, the call time, length of call and phone number appears in the display.

- Press the right soft key Save. You're prompted to confirm this as a Create New, or Update Existing.
- 3. Follow the on-screen prompts to designate other information.

Adding Pauses

Calls to automated systems often require a password or account number. Instead of manually entering numbers each time, store the numbers to your Contacts along with special characters called pauses.

- 1. In idle mode, enter the number.
- Press Options use the navigation key to highlight Wait (A "W" appears in the display.) or 2-sec Pause (A "P" appears in the display.) and press
 - **Wait**: A hard pause stops the calling sequence until further input from you.
 - 2-sec pause: A two-second pause stops the calling sequence for two seconds and then automatically sends the remaining digits.
- 3. When you're finished entering information for the entry, press SAVE.
- 4. Continue with Step 2, Method 2 of Adding a Contact.

Note: Entering multiple two-second pauses extends the length of a pause. For example, two consecutive two-second pauses cause a total pause time of four seconds. Keep in mind pauses count as digits towards the 48-digit maximum.

Contact Groups

You can place Contact entries into categories, called "**Groups**." Groups allow you to search your Contacts faster, quickly send messages to one or more group members, and more.

Note: By default, new entries to your Contacts are placed into the No Group unless another group is specified.

View Groups

- 1. In idle mode, press MENU, Contacts is highlighted, press ...
- 2. Press 3 (Groups. The following groups appear in the display.
 - No Group
 - Business
 - Colleague
 - Family
 - Friends

Use the navigation key to highlight the desired group, then press to access the group and view its contents.

Move an Entry to Another Group

- In idle mode, press the right soft key Contacts. Use the navigation key to highlight the contact you wish to move.
- Press the left soft key Edit. Use the up/down navigation key to scroll to the Group option.
- 3. Press the left soft key **Set**. Choose from the following groups:
 - No Group
 - Business
 - Colleague
 - Family
 - Friends
- Use the navigation key to highlight the group containing the entry that you wish to move, then press
- 5. Press SAVE. The selection has been saved to the designated group.

Create a New Group

In addition to the five groups already in your phone, you can create additional groups (a maximum of 25). New groups can be named anything you like as long as their names are within the 32-character limit.

- 1. In idle mode, press MENU, Contacts is highlighted, press ...
- 2. Press 3 (Groups. Your existing groups appear in the display.
- Press the left soft key New. A NEW GROUP pop-up menu displays with the "Enter New Name" field highlighted.
- 4. Enter the Groups name.
- Press SAVE to save. The Groups list now displays the new group added

Send a Text Message to Members of a Group

Use Send Message in the Group feature to send a message to as many as 10 members of a group at once.

Note: Text messaging availability varies when roaming off the Verizon Wireless Network.

- In idle mode, press MENU, Contacts is highlighted, press .
- 2. Press 3 (Groups. Your existing groups appear in the display.

- Highlight the desired group name and press the right soft key
 Options. Highlight Send TXT Message and press .
- Use the down navigation key to highlight the contacts in the group you want to send a message. Press to place a checkmark next to each selection to send messages to.
- **5.** Press the left soft key **Done** after selecting up to 10 contacts.

Note: You can mark up to 10 members of a group for message distribution. If you try and mark an 11th member, you'll be notified that "MAXIMUM RECIPIENTS IS 10".

- 6. Press the down navigation key to place the cursor in the Text field.
- 7. Enter the content of your message using the keypad.
- 8. To send the text message, press SEND.

Send a Picture Message to Members of a Group

Note: Only available within Verizon Wireless Enhanced Services Area.

- 1. In idle mode, press MENU, Contacts is highlighted, press .
- 2. Press 3 (Groups. Your existing groups appear in the display.
- Highlight the desired group name and press the right soft key
 Options. Highlight Send Picture Message and press .
- 4. Use the down navigation key to highlight the contacts in the group to which you want to send a message. Press to place a checkmark next to each selection to send messages to.
- 5. Press the left soft key **Done** after selecting up to 10 contacts.
- 6. Press the down navigation key to move the cursor into the following entry fields:
 - Text: Add text to the Picture Message.
 - Picture: Add an image from the My Pictures to the message.
 - Sound: Add sound to the Picture Message.
 - Subject: Add a subject to the Picture Message.
 - Name Card: Attach a Name Card or an entry in your Contacts to the message.
- Once you've finished adding the desired content to your Picture Message, press SEND to send the Picture Message to the intended recipients.

Send a Video Message to Members of a Group

Note: Only available within Verizon Wireless Enhanced Services Area.

- 1. In idle mode, press MENU, Contacts is highlighted, press ...
- 2. Press 3 (Groups. Your existing groups appear in the display.
- 3. Highlight the desired group name and press the right soft key **2 Options**. Highlight **Send Video Message** and press **3**.
- 4. Use the down navigation key to highlight the contacts in the group to which you want to send a message. Press to place a checkmark next to each selection to send messages to.
- 5. Press the left soft key **Done** after selecting up to 10 contacts.
- 6. Press the down navigation key to move the cursor into the following entry fields:
 - · Text: Add text to the Video Message.
 - Video: Add an image from the My Video to the message.
 - · Subject: Add a subject to the Video Message.
 - Name Card: Attach a Name Card or an entry in your Contacts to the message.
- Once you've finished adding the desired content to your Video Message, press SEND to send the Video Message to the intended recipients.

Finding a Contacts Entry

From idle mode, you can quickly open the Contacts list. Contacts is a quick way of viewing entries you've stored in the Contacts list.

- In idle mode, press the right soft key Contacts. The Contact List displays.
- 2. In the **Go To** field, enter the first and second letters of the name you wish to search until it is highlighted.

Editing an Existing Contact Entry

- 1. In idle mode, press MENU, Contacts is highlighted, press ...
- 2. Press 2 (Contact List.
- Use the navigation key to highlight the contact list entry and press the left soft key Edit.
- Use the navigation key to highlight the name, number, e-mail address, or other field that you wish to edit.
- 5. Press to backspace and delete numbers, text, or symbols.

- **6.** Press and hold to erase all numbers in the highlighted field.
- 7. Use the keypad to re-enter numbers, text, or symbols.
- When you're finished editing the entry, press SAVE. Your changes are saved.

Deleting a Contact Entry

- 1. In idle mode, press MENU, Contacts is highlighted, press
- 2. Press 2 (Contact List.
- 3. Use the navigation key to display the contact list entry and press VIEW.
- 4. Press the left soft key **Erase**.
- 5. A pop-up "ERASE ENTRY?" screen displays.
- 6. Highlight Yes or No, then press

Storing Numbers After a Call

Once you've finished a call, you can store the number of the caller to your Contact List.

Note: If the call was incoming and Caller ID information was unavailable, then the store option is also unavailable.

- After you press to end your call, the call time, length of call and phone number appears in the display.
- Press the right soft key Save. You're prompted to confirm this as a Create New, or Update Existing.
- 3. Follow the on-screen prompts to designate other information.

Store a number in idle mode

Store a phone number by entering the number in idle mode, then press **Save**. Follow the screen prompts to assign number types and other information.

Speed Dialing

Note: 1-Touch, 2-Touch, and 3-Touch dialing allows you to call numbers stored in your Contact List quicker.

Speed dialing allows you to press and hold a key (or keys) to dial the number associated with those key(s). There are three types of speed dialing; **1-touch**, **2-touch**, and **3-touch dialing**.

1-touch dialing

Call phone numbers assigned to memory locations 002 - 009 by pressing and holding the any of the 2 - 9 keys. For example, to speed dial the number assigned to location 2, press and hold 2 () until the name and number appear in the display and the number is dialed.

2-touch dialing

Call phone numbers assigned to keys 010 through 099 by briefly pressing the first key, then pressing and holding the second key. For example, to speed dial the number assigned to 013, briefly press 1 (), then press and hold 3 () until the number dials.

3-touch dialing

Call phone numbers assigned to memory locations 100 through 999 by briefly pressing the first and second keys, then pressing and holding the third key. For example, to dial location number 113, briefly press 1 (), 1 (), then press and hold 3 (), until the number dials.

Assign a speed dial location

- In idle mode, press MENU, Contacts is highlighted, press ...
- Press 4 () Speed Dials. The Speed Dials screen displays with the first available number highlighted.
- Use the navigation keys to highlight the number you wish to assign or enter the speed dial location using the keypad, press SET.
- 4. The SET SPEED DIAL screen displays.
- 5. Use the navigation keys to highlight the entry you want, then press
- At the pop-up screen, use the navigation key to highlight Yes or No and press
- Continue to assign speed dial entries or press the key to return to idle mode.

My Name Card

My Name Card allows you to create a virtual business card. Once completed, you can send the card to recipients as a V-card attachment.

- In idle mode, press MENU, Contacts is highlighted, press .
- 2. Press 5 (My Name Card.
- 3. My Name Card opens with the Name field highlighted.
- 4. Enter information in each of the fields as desired. Use the navigation key to move between fields, then use the keypad to enter information.
- 5. When finished, press to save the Name Card.

Finding My Phone Number

My Number displays the ten-digit number assigned to your phone.

- In idle mode, press MENU, then press the right navigation key to Settings & Tools and press .
- 2. Press 9 (Phone Info.
- Press 1 () My Number. The mobile device, phone number, and mobile identification number are displayed.

This section allows you to send or receive different types of messages. It also includes the features and functionality associated with messaging.

Types of Messages

Your phone is capable of sending email, text, picture, video, sketch, post cards and voicemail messages. Send email, text, picture, and video messages by simply entering the email address or the phone number of the recipient in the To: <......> or Send To field when creating a new message.

Retrieving New Messages

While text messages from other phones are delivered directly to your phone, Picture and Video messages and emails will be stored in the Inbox of the message server and the server will alert you to new messages. Therefore you need to retrieve new messages to your phone and read them on the phone.

Retrieving a Text Message

When you receive a message in idle mode, the message ringer sounds, (unless turned off), and New Text Message appears in the display along with the closed envelope icon . The date and time of the message also appear in the display.

- Press to View now, or press the down navigation key to highlight View later and press . The message is saved to your inbox where you can view it later.
- With the message open, press the right soft key options to Forward, Reply w/copy, Save Quick Text, Lock, Add To Contacts or Message Info. Press the left soft key Frase to erase the message.
- With the message open, press REPLY to return a message to the sender

Note: When viewing a Text message, you can view the previous Text message by pressing the left navigation key and view the next Text message by pressing the right navigation key.

Creating and Sending Text Messages

You can send text messages to another mobile phone or to an email address.

- 1. In idle mode, press the left soft key Message.
- 2. Press 1 (New Message.
- 3. Press 1 () TXT Message to compose a new text message.
- Enter the phone number or email address of the recipient. At any point
 while entering your recipient(s) phone number or email address, press the
 123 or Add soft keys to display additional options.
- Press the left soft key 123 to change Text Entry Mode. Choose Word, Abc, ABC, 123, Symbols and Shortcuts modes of text entry.
- Press the right soft key Add to add a recipient From Contacts, Groups, or Recent Calls

- 5. Press the down navigation key or key to move to the Text field. In the text field, compose your message using the keypad. At any point while composing a message, press the Abc or Options soft keys to display additional options.
 - Press the left soft key Abc to change Text Entry Mode. Choose VoiceMode, Word, Abc, ABC, 123, and Symbols modes of text entry.
 - Press the right soft key Options to display a pop-up menu with the options listed:
 - Save As Draft: Save the message to your Draft folder.
 - Add Graphic: Lists preloaded and downloaded graphics.
 - · Add Animation: Lists preloaded and downloaded animations.
 - · Add Sound: Lists preloaded and downloaded sounds.
 - Add Quick Text: Choose from up to 12 pre-loaded messages. You can add 10
 additional messages by pressing the right soft key
 New and erase
 messages by pressing the left soft key
 - Add Name Card: Attach My Name Card information or information from one of your Contacts.
 - Edit Text Format: Allows you to edit the text size, alignment, style, color, and background color.
 - Priority Level: Save the message with a High or Normal priority.
 - Callback #: Provides the ability to send a callback # with the message.
 - Enh. Delivery Ack: Displays a pop-up screen notifying the message sent has been received.
 - Cancel Message: Cancels the message and allows you to save it in the Drafts folder.

- Use the navigation key to highlight an option. Press to perform the function for the option, or to enter its sub-menu.
- 7. To send the message, press SEND.

Creating and Sending Picture-Video Messages

Note: Only available within Verizon Wireless Enhanced Services Area.

Picture-Video Message combines text, picture, video and sound creating an message intuitive message You can add sounds and attach a Name Card or Contact entry to your Picture-Video Message. This is also known as Multimedia Messaging (MMS).

- 1. In idle mode, press the left soft key Message.
- 2. Press 1 (New Message.
- Press 2 () Picture Message or 3 () Video Message to compose a new message.
- Enter the phone number or email address of the recipient. At any point
 while entering your recipient(s) phone number or email address, press the
 123 or Add soft keys to display additional options.
 - Press the left soft key 123 to change Text Entry Mode. Choose Word, Abc, ABC, 123, Symbols and Shortcuts modes of text entry.
 - Press the right soft key Add to add a recipient From Contacts, Groups, Recent Calls. or To PIX Place.

- 5. Press the down navigation key or key to move to the Text field. In the text field, compose your message using the keypad. At any point while composing a message, press the Abc or Options soft keys to display additional options.
 - Press the left soft key
 Abc to change Text Entry Mode. Choose VoiceMode, Word, Abc, ABC, 123, and Symbols modes of text entry.
 - Press the right soft key Options to display a pop-up menu with the options listed:
 - Preview: Shows the message before it is sent.
 - Save As Draft: Save the message to your Draft folder.
 - Add Quick Text: Choose from up to 12 pre-loaded messages. You can add 10
 additional messages by pressing the right soft key New and erase
 messages by pressing the left soft key Frase.
 - Priority Level: Save the message with a High or Normal priority.
 - Cancel Message: Cancels the message and allows you to save it in the Drafts folder.

Note: If you do not select an option press the to return to your message.

- 6. Press the down navigation key to highlight the Picture-Video field. Press the left soft key My Pic-My Video to add a Picture/Video, and follow the prompts. Press to attach the highlighted object.
- If creating a Picture message, press the up/down navigation key to highlight the Sound field. Press the left soft key Sounds to select a sound.
 - Press the up/down navigation key to highlight the desired sound or highlight **Record New** to record a sound and press .
- Press the down navigation key to add Name Card. Press the left soft key
 Add to select My Name Card or an entry from your Contacts list.
 Follow the prompts and press to insert.
- 10. Once all fields are complete, press to send the message to the intended recipient(s).

Creating and Sending Messages in Landscape Mode

 For more detailed procedures, refer to "Creating and Sending Messages -Landscape Mode" on page 127.

Receiving Picture-Video Messages

When you receive a new Picture-Video Message, **NEW PIC-VIDEO MSG** appears in the display along with the options **View Now**, or **View Later**.

Note: For the option Reject to appear in the display when you receive a Picture-Video Message, Auto Receive mode must be set to Off in the Message Settings menu.

- When you receive a new Picture-Video Message, press Wiew Now. Loading... appears in the display.
- 2. After loading, the image (and text if any) contained in the Picture-Video Message appear in the display.
- Use the navigation keys to scroll through the message or view the entire picture if necessary.

- 4. Press the Mute/Unmute/Play (to play the attached sound byte or video) or Options soft keys to display the following options:
 - Play Again: Replays the sound in the message.
 - Forward: Forward the message to another recipient.
 - Erase: Deletes the message.
 - · Save Picture: Saves the picture in a Picture-Video message to My Picture
 - Save Sound: Saves the sound received with the message.
 - Save As Ringtone: Saves the sound as a ringtone.
 - Save Quick Text: Saves the text received in the message to the Quick Text list.
 - Lock/Unlock: Locks the message to prevent deletion.
 - Add To Contacts: Save the number of the sender to your Contacts as a new entry
 or add to an existing entry.
 - Message Info: Provides the following information: From and Callback Number, Priority, Message Type, Size and if a Graphic, Sound or Name Card were included in the message.

Note: When viewing a Picture-Video message, you can view the previous Picture-Video message by pressing the left navigation key and view the next Picture-Video message by pressing the right navigation key.

Receive Messages While in a Call

 When you receive a message while in a call, the NEW TXT MESSAGE or NEW PIC-VIDEO MESSAGE(S) dialog box appears in the display.

Note: Text messages can only be viewed during a call. Picture-Video messages can not be downloaded during a call.

- You can view the message without disconnecting your call by pressing Options and then select Messaging.

View a Picture-Video Message Later

- When you receive a new Picture-Video message that you would like to view later, highlight View Later and press
- 2. To view the message, press the left soft key Message, 2 (limits) Inhox
- Use the navigation key to highlight the unopened message, then press OPEN. The INBOX screen appears first with information about the message. Press DOWNLOAD to view Picture-Video message.

New Sketch Messages

You can convert a picture to a black and white sketch drawing that can be sent with a message. For information on taking a picture see "Take Pictures" on page 108. For information on sending the message, see "Receiving Picture-Video Messages" on page 64.

Postcard Message

Allows you send pictures saved in your phone or take new pictures with your camera and send as a postcard. A postcard message merges handwritten notes with pictures you have taken with your phone. Please note that downloaded photos that have DRM protection can not be used with this feature.

Creating and Sending a Postcard

- In idle mode, press the left soft key Message.
- 2. Press 1 (New Message.
- Press 5 () Postcard Message to compose a new message.
 MY PICTURES appear in the display.
- Use the navigation key to select a photo and press . The camera is activated.
- Press TAKE to capture an image of your handwritten note. A merged picture of your note and picture will be Shown.
- Press the right soft key options to customize the image. The following options appear in the display:
 - Ink Color: Allows you to choose the outline color of the image.
 - Shadow: Allows you to turn shadow On or Off.
 - Rotate: Allows you to rotate the image. Press the right or left navigation to rotate the image.
 - Zoom: Allows you adjust the zoom on the image. Press the left or right navigation key to adjust the zoom.
 - Move: Allows you to move the image. Press the navigation key to move the image.

Press the left soft key **Erase** to erase the image and return to camera mode.

- Press SEND.
- Enter the phone number or email address of the recipient. At any point
 while entering your recipient(s) phone number or email address, press the
 123 or Add soft keys to display additional options.

- Press the left soft key
 123 to change Text Entry Mode. Choose Word, Abc, ABC, 123, Symbols and Shortcuts modes of text entry.
- Press the right soft key Add to add a recipient From Contacts, Groups, Recent Calls, or To PIX Place.

Note: If you do not select an option press the to return to your message.

- 9. Press the down navigation key or key to move to the Text field. In the text field, compose your message using the keypad. At any point while composing a message, press the Abc or Options soft keys to display additional options.
 - Press the left soft key Abc to change Text Entry Mode. Choose VoiceMode, Word, Abc, ABC, 123, and Symbols modes of text entry.
 - Press the right soft key Options to display a pop-up menu with the options listed:
 - · Preview: Shows the message before it is sent.
 - Save As Draft: Save the message to your Draft folder.
 - Add Quick Text: Choose from up to 12 pre-loaded messages. You can add 10
 additional messages by pressing the right soft key New and erase
 messages by pressing the left soft key Erase.
 - Priority Level: Save the message with a High or Normal priority.

- 13. Press the down navigation key to add Name Card. Press the left soft key Add to select My Name Card or an entry from your Contacts list. Follow the prompts and press to insert.

14. Once all fields are complete, press SEND to send the message to the intended recipient(s).

Message Folders

Note: To quickly view all messages in the Inbox, Sent, or Drafts folders, open one message and then press the right navigation key to view the next message or press the left navigation key to view the previous message.

Inbox

Received messages of all types are stored in the Inbox folder.

- In idle mode, press the left soft key Message.
- 2. Press 2 () Inbox.
- 3. Use the navigation key to highlight the message that you wish to view.
- **4.** Press OPEN to view contents of the highlighted message.
- While viewing a message press the right soft key Options to display the options listed.

 - Erase: Deletes the message. Only displays in menu when a sound byte isn't attached to the message that was sent.
 - Save Picture: Saves the picture-video sent in a Picture-Video message to My Pictures or My Video.
 - Save Sound: Saves the sound byte received with the message in My Sounds.
 - Save As Ringtone: Saves the sound byte received with the message a ringtone.
 - Save Quick Text: Saves the text received in the message to the Quick Text list.
 - Save Name Card: Saves the name card received in the message.
 - Lock/Unlock: Secures/Unsecures the message to prevent deletion.
 - Add To Contacts: Save the number of the sender to your Contacts as a new entry
 or add to an existing entry.
 - Message Info: Provides the following information: From (also provides the date and time the message was sent), Callback Number, Priority, Message Type, Size and if a Picture, Sound or Name Card were included in the message.

Note: If no sound byte or video is attached to the message, press the left soft key Frase to delete the message or press the left soft key Mute/Unmute/Play to play or mute/unmute the sound byte attached to the message.

6. Press REPLY to return a message to the sender.

Note: When Auto Erase is turned on, the oldest read Text message is replaced by an incoming Text message when 50 Text messages are stored in the Inbox, and the oldest read Picture-Video message is replaced by an incoming Picture-Video message when 80 Picture-Video messages are stored in the Inbox. See 'Changing Message Settings' on page 73 for information on how to set Auto Erase and Auto Receive.

Sent

Your phone stores messages in the Sent folder, regardless of whether the message was successfully transmitted. Verify if and when a message or e-mail was successfully transmitted by enabling the **Enh. Delivery Ack** feature in Message Settings.

Note: Enh. Delivery Ack can't be set for Picture-Video message.

Review Messages in the Sent Folder

- 7. Press RESEND to send the message to the recipeint again.

Drafts

Draft messages are those that have been composed but never sent. You can return to the Drafts folder at any time to view, edit, or send a draft message.

Erase Options

You can erase unlocked messages in your Inbox, Drafts folder, or Sent folder. Locked messages are not erased.

Voicemail

Bluetooth Menu

About Bluetooth

Bluetooth is a short-range wireless communications technology capable of exchanging information over a distance of about 30 feet without requiring a physical connection

Unlike infrared, you don't need to line up the devices to beam information with Bluetooth. If the devices are within a range of one another, you can exchange information between them, even if they are located in different rooms.

Note: When connected to your Bluetooth headset, press the headset send key to use VoiceSignal's Voice Dial feature.

Bluetooth Service Profiles

Actually, the Bluetooth specification is a protocol that describes how the short-range wireless technology works, whereas individual profiles describe the services supported by individual devices. Profiles reduce the chance that different devices will not work together.

Your phone supports the following profile service:

. HSP: Headset profile

The HSP describes how a Bluetooth enabled headset should communicate with a computer or other Bluetooth enabled device such as a mobile phone. When connected and configured, the headset can act as the remote device's audio input and output interface.

HFP: Hands-free profile*

HFP describes how a gateway device can be used to place and receive calls for a hand-free device. A typical configuration is an automobile using a mobile phone for a gateway device. In the car, the stereo is used for the phone audio and a microphone is installed in the car for sending outgoing audio of the conversation. HFP is also used for a personal computer to act as a speakerphone for a mobile phone in a home or office environment.

. SPP: Serial Port profile

SPP defines how to set-up virtual serial ports and connect two Bluetooth enabled devices.

DUN: Dial Up Networking

DUN provides a standard to access the Internet and other dial-up services over Bluetooth wireless technology. The most common scenario is accessing the Internet from a laptop by dialing up on a mobile phone, wirelessly.

• OPP: Object Push Profile (vCard only)

The following Bluetooth options are available:

On/Off

When the Bluetooth radio is turned on, you can use the Bluetooth features available. When the Bluetooth radio is turned off, you cannot send or receive information via Bluetooth. To save battery life or in situations where radio use is prohibited, such as airline traveling, you can turn off the Bluetooth wireless technology.

- In idle mode, press MENU key and use the right navigation key to highlight Settings Tools and press .
- Press 3 (Bluetooth Menu. The Bluetooth menus are listed in the display.
- 3. Press the left soft key late to turn Bluetooth On or Off.

Note: If Bluetooth is turned on, the 🅦 Bluetooth icon displays in the top line of the display.

Search

This option searches for a recognized Bluetooth wireless technology device.

- 3. Add New Device is highlighted, press pt twice.

Note: If you have NOT already activated Bluetooth on the phone, the message "TURN BLUETOOTH ON?" displays. Highlight Yes to activate or No to exit and press 👛 .

 A list of found Bluetooth devices will be displayed. Use the Up and Down navigation keys to highlight a Bluetooth device. Press to pair the devices.







You can perform calculations, including addition, subtraction, multiplication and division using your phone.

- In idle mode, press MENU, then press the right navigation key to Settings & Tools and press .
- 2. Press 2 () Tools, 2 () Calculator, 1 () Normal. The Calculator opens.
- Enter the first number in your equation using the keypad. (Numbers can be up to nine digits long.)
- 4. Press the right soft key poperator to display a pop-up menu which allows you to enter a Parenthesis or Power if desired. Press the left soft key Clear or to clear all data entered.
- 5. Press # () to change the sign for a number to a negative.
- 6. Press the * () to add a decimal point.

- The Alarm field is highlighted. Use the left/right navigation keys to select On or Off
- Press the down navigation key to highlight the **Time** field, then enter the time that you wish for the alarm to sound.
- Press the down navigation key once to highlight the am/pm field. Use the left/right navigation keys to select am or pm.
- Press the down navigation key once to highlight the Frequency field. Use the left/right navigation keys to set the frequency (occurrence) of the alarm. Below lists and defines the options for this field.
 - · Once: The alarm sounds only once, at the time specified.
 - · Daily: The alarm sounds every day at the time specified.
 - Mon-Fri: The alarm sounds Monday through Friday at the time specified.
 - · Weekends: The alarm sounds Saturday through Sunday at the time specified.
- Press the down navigation key once to highlight the first Ringer field. Use the left/right navigation keys to set the ringer to Tone, Vibrate, or Light Only.
- 10. If you selected Tone, press the down navigation key again to highlight the second field. Use the left/right navigation keys to set the alert tone to VZW Default Tone, or select a tone from your My Ringtones or My Sounds folders.
- 11. When all fields have correct information entered, press SAVE to save your settings.

Disable an alarm before it sounds

- In idle mode, press MENU, then press the right navigation key to Settings & Tools and press .
- Press 2 () Tools, 4 () Alarm Clock. The Alarm Clock menu displays with the Alarm 1 highlighted.

Opening Your Phone to a Landscape View

The following illustration shows how to properly open the phone to a Landscape orientation:



- 1. Close the phone.
- 2. Carefully grab the outer LCD section of the phone and turn it to the right.

Note: Be careful not to try and twist/turn the LCD into a Landscape orientation while the phone is in a Portrait orientation (step 1 above), as this can damage the LCD.

Open View of Your Phone - Landscape Mode

The following illustration shows the main internal features of your phone, as available in Landscape mode:



Features

- 1. Alpha-numeric Kevpad: Use these keys to enter numbers, letters, and characters.
- 2. Navigation Keys: These keys allow you to scroll through the phone menu options.
- 3. Clear Key: Deletes characters from the display when you are in text entry mode. Press to return to the previous menu or screen when navigating features on your phone.
- 4. Left Soft Key (Landscape): This key is used to navigate through menus and applications by selecting the choice available in the Left Soft key Option.
- 5. NumLock Key: Use this key to toggle among the different text input metthods. The currently selected input method can be shown at either the upper-right or lower-left corners of the display, depending on the currently application.

- 6. Spacebar Key: Allows you to add spaces between words and characters.
- 7. Shift Key: Allows you to toggle the casing for Alphabet characters between lowercase and uppercase.
- 8. Fn Key: Activates functions when pressed in conjuction with certain keys.
- 9. Right Soft Key (Landscape): This key is used to navigate through menus and applications by selecting the choice available in the Right Soft key Option.
- 10. Enter Key: Press to perform the function highlighted in the menu or submenu
- 11. Backspace Key: Erases or clears letters, numbers, or other characters from a display field.

Making a Call - Landscape Mode

Health and Safety Information

Exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) Signals

Certification Information (SAR)

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the exposure limits for radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. government. These FCC exposure limits are derived from the recommendations of two expert organizations, the National Counsel on Radiation Protection and Measurement (NCRP) and the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE). In both cases, the recommendations were developed by scientific and engineering experts drawn

from industry, government, and academia after extensive reviews of the scientific literature related to the biological effects of RF energy.

The exposure limit set by the FCC for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The SAR is a measure of the rate of absorption of RF energy by the human body expressed in units of watts per kilogram (W/kg). The FCC requires wireless phones to comply with a safety limit of 1.6 watts per kilogram (1.6 W/kg). The FCC exposure limit incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection to the public and to account for any variations in measurements.

SAR tests are conducted using standard operating positions accepted by the FCC with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output.

Before a new model phone is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed the exposure limit established by the FCC. Tests for each model phone are performed in positions and locations (e.g. at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC. For body worn operation, this phone has been tested and meets FCC RF exposure guidelines when used with an accessory that contains no metal and that positions the handset a minimum of 1.5 cm from the body. Use of other accessories may not ensure compliance with FCC RF exposure auidelines.

The FCC has granted an Equipment Authorization for this mobile phone with all reported SAR levels evaluated as in compliance with the FCC RF exposure guidelines. The maximum SAR values for this model phone as reported to the FCC are:

- Head: 0.684 W/kg
- Body-worn: 0.496W/kg

SAR information on this and other model phones can be viewed on-line at www.fcc.gov/oet/fccid. To find information that pertains to a particular model phone, this site uses the phone FCC ID number which is usually printed somewhere on the case of the phone. Sometimes it may be necessary to remove the battery pack to find the number. Once you have the FCC ID number for a particular phone. follow the instructions on the website and it should provide values for typical or maximum SAR for a particular phone. Additional product specific SAR information can also be obtained at www.fcc.gov/cgb/sar.

Consumer Information on Wireless Phones

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has published a series of Questions and Answers for consumers relating to radio frequency (RF) exposure from wireless phones. The FDA publication includes the following information:

What kinds of phones are the subject of this update?

The term wireless phone refers here to hand-held wireless phones with built-in antennas, often called "cell," "mobile," or "PCS" phones. These types of wireless phones can expose the user to measurable radio frequency energy (RF) because of the short distance between the phone and the user's head. These RF exposures are limited by Federal Communications Commission safety guidelines that were developed with the advice of FDA and other federal health and safety agencies. When the phone is located at greater distances from the user, the exposure to RF is drastically lower because a person's RF exposure decreases rapidly with increasing distance from the source. The so-called "cordless phones," which have a base unit connected to the telephone wiring in a house, typically operate at far lower power levels, and thus produce RF exposures well within the FCC's compliance limits.

Do wireless phones pose a health hazard?

The available scientific evidence does not show that any health problems are associated with using wireless phones. There is no proof, however, that wireless phones are absolutely safe. Wireless phones emit low levels of radio frequency energy (RF) in the microwave range while being used. They also emit very low levels of RF when in the stand-by mode. Whereas high levels of RF can produce health effects (by heating tissue), exposure to low level RF that does not produce heating

effects causes no known adverse health effects. Many studies of low level RF exposures have not found any biological effects. Some studies have suggested that some biological effects may occur, but such findings have not been confirmed by additional research. In some cases, other researchers have had difficulty in reproducing those studies, or in determining the reasons for inconsistent results.

What is FDA's role concerning the safety of wireless phones?

Under the law, FDA does not review the safety of radiation-emitting consumer products such as wireless phones before they can be sold, as it does with new drugs or medical devices. However, the agency has authority to take action if wireless phones are shown to emit radio frequency energy (RF) at a level that is hazardous to the user. In such a case, FDA could require the manufacturers of wireless phones to notify users of the health hazard and to repair, replace or recall the phones so that the hazard no longer exists.

Although the existing scientific data do not justify FDA regulatory actions, FDA has urged the wireless phone industry to take a number of steps, including the following:

- Support needed research into possible biological effects of RF of the type emitted by wireless phones:
- Design wireless phones in a way that minimizes any RF exposure to the user that is not necessary for device function; and
- Cooperate in providing users of wireless phones with the best possible information on possible effects of wireless phone use on human health.

FDA belongs to an interagency working group of the federal agencies that have responsibility for different aspects of RF safety to ensure coordinated efforts at the federal level. The following agencies belong to this working group:

- National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health
- Environmental Protection Agency
- Federal Communications Commission
- Occupational Safety and Health Administration
- National Telecommunications and Information Administration

The National Institutes of Health participates in some interagency working group activities, as well.

FDA shares regulatory responsibilities for wireless phones with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). All phones that are sold in the United States must comply with FCC safety quidelines that limit RF exposure. FCC relies on FDA and other health agencies for safety questions about wireless phones.

FCC also regulates the base stations that the wireless phone networks rely upon. While these base stations operate at higher power than do the wireless phones themselves, the RF exposures that people get from these base stations are typically thousands of times lower than those they can get from wireless phones. Base stations are thus not the primary subject of the safety questions discussed in this document.

What are the results of the research done already?

The research done thus far has produced conflicting results, and many studies have suffered from flaws in their research methods. Animal experiments investigating the effects of radio frequency energy (RF) exposures characteristic of wireless phones have yielded conflicting results that often cannot be repeated in other laboratories. A few animal studies, however, have suggested that low levels of RF could accelerate the development of cancer in laboratory animals. However, many of the studies that showed increased tumor development used animals that had been genetically engineered or treated with cancer-causing chemicals so as to be pre-disposed to develop cancer in absence of RF exposure. Other studies exposed the animals to RF for up to 22 hours per day. These conditions are not similar to the conditions under which people use wireless phones, so we don't know with certainty what the results of such studies mean for human health.

Three large epidemiology studies have been published since December 2000. Between them, the studies investigated any possible association between the use of wireless phones and primary brain cancer, glioma, meningioma, or acoustic neuroma, tumors of the brain or salivary gland, leukemia, or other cancers. None of the studies demonstrated the existence of any harmful health effects from wireless phones RF exposures. However, none of the studies can answer questions about long-term exposures, since the average period of phone use in these studies was around three years.

What research is needed to decide whether RF exposure from wireless phones poses a health risk?

A combination of laboratory studies and epidemiological studies of people actually using wireless phones would provide some of the data that are needed. Lifetime animal exposure studies could be completed in a few years. However, very large numbers of animals would be needed to provide reliable proof of a cancer promoting effect if one exists. Epidemiological studies can provide data that is directly applicable to human populations, but ten or more years' follow-up may be needed to provide answers about some health effects, such as cancer. This is because the interval between the time of exposure to a cancer-causing agent and the time tumors develop - if they do - may be many, many years. The interpretation of

epidemiological studies is hampered by difficulties in measuring actual RF exposure during day-to-day use of wireless phones. Many factors affect this measurement, such as the angle at which the phone is held, or which model of phone is used.

What is FDA doing to find out more about the possible health effects of wireless phone RF?

FDA is working with the U.S. National Toxicology Program and with groups of investigators around the world to ensure that high priority animal studies are conducted to address important questions about the effects of exposure to radio frequency energy (RF).

FDA has been a leading participant in the World Health Organization international Electromagnetic Fields (EMF) Project since its inception in 1996. An influential result of this work has been the development of a detailed agenda of research needs that has driven the establishment of new research programs around the world. The Project has also helped develop a series of public information documents on EMF issues.

FDA and Cellular Telecommunications & Internet Association (CTIA) have a formal Cooperative Research and Development Agreement (CRADA) to do research on wireless phone safety. FDA provides the scientific oversight, obtaining input from experts in government, industry, and academic organizations. CTIA-funded research is conducted through contracts to independent investigators. The initial research will include both laboratory studies and studies of wireless phone users. The CRADA will also include a broad assessment of additional research needs in the context of the latest research developments around the world.

What steps can I take to reduce my exposure to radio frequency energy from my wireless phone?

If there is a risk from these products - and at this point we do not know that there is - it is probably very small. But if you are concerned about avoiding even potential risks, you can take a few simple steps to minimize your exposure to radio frequency energy (RF). Since time is a key factor in how much exposure a person receives, reducing the amount of time spent using a wireless phone will reduce RF exposure.

• If you must conduct extended conversations by wireless phone every day, you could place more distance between your body and the source of the RF, since the exposure level drops off dramatically with distance. For example, you could use a headset and carry the wireless phone away from your body or use a wireless phone connected to a remote antenna.

Again, the scientific data do not demonstrate that wireless phones are harmful. But if you are concerned about the RF exposure from these products, you can use

measures like those described above to reduce your RF exposure from wireless phone use.

What about children using wireless phones?

The scientific evidence does not show a danger to users of wireless phones, including children and teenagers. If you want to take steps to lower exposure to radio frequency energy (RF), the measures described above would apply to children and teenagers using wireless phones. Reducing the time of wireless phone use and increasing the distance between the user and the RF source will reduce RF exposure.

Some groups sponsored by other national governments have advised that children be discouraged from using wireless phones at all. For example, the government in the United Kingdom distributed leaflets containing such a recommendation in December 2000. They noted that no evidence exists that using a wireless phone causes brain tumors or other ill effects. Their recommendation to limit wireless phone use by children was strictly precautionary; it was not based on scientific evidence that any health hazard exists.

Do hands-free kits for wireless phones reduce risks from exposure to RF emissions?

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from wireless phones, there is no reason to believe that hands-free kits reduce risks. Hands-free kits can be used with wireless phones for convenience and comfort. These systems reduce the absorption of RF energy in the head because the phone, which is the source of the RF emissions, will not be placed against the head. On the other hand, if the phone is mounted against the waist or other part of the body during use, then that part of the body will absorb more RF energy. Wireless phones marketed in the U.S. are required to meet safety requirements regardless of whether they are used against the head or against the body. Either configuration should result in compliance with the safety limit.

Do wireless phone accessories that claim to shield the head from RF radiation work?

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from wireless phones, there is no reason to believe that accessories that claim to shield the head from those emissions reduce risks. Some products that claim to shield the user from RF absorption use special phone cases, while others involve nothing more than a metallic accessory attached to the phone. Studies have shown that these products generally do not work as advertised. Unlike "hand-free" kits, these so-called "shields" may interfere with proper operation of the phone. The phone may be

forced to boost its power to compensate, leading to an increase in RF absorption. In February 2002, the Federal trade Commission (FTC) charged two companies that sold devices that claimed to protect wireless phone users from radiation with making false and unsubstantiated claims. According to FTC, these defendants lacked a reasonable basis to substantiate their claim.

What about wireless phone interference with medical equipment?

Radio frequency energy (RF) from wireless phones can interact with some electronic devices. For this reason, FDA helped develop a detailed test method to measure electromagnetic interference (EMI) of implanted cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators from wireless telephones. This test method is now part of a standard sponsored by the Association for the Advancement of Medical instrumentation (AAMI). The final draft, a joint effort by FDA, medical device manufacturers, and many other groups, was completed in late 2000. This standard will allow manufacturers to ensure that cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators are safe from wireless phone EMI. FDA has tested wireless phones and helped develop a voluntary standard sponsored by the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE). This standard specifies test methods and performance requirements for hearing aids and wireless phones so that no interference occurs when a person uses a compatible phone and a compatible hearing aid at the same time. This standard was approved by the IEEE in 2000.

FDA continues to monitor the use of wireless phones for possible interactions with other medical devices. Should harmful interference be found to occur. FDA will conduct testing to assess the interference and work to resolve the problem.

Road Safety

Your wireless phone gives you the powerful ability to communicate by voice, almost anywhere, anytime. But an important responsibility accompanies the benefits of wireless phones, one that every user must uphold.

When driving a car, driving is your first responsibility. When using your wireless phone behind the wheel of a car, practice good common sense and remember the following tips:

- Get to know your wireless phone and its features, such as speed dial and redial. If available, these features help you to place your call without taking your attention off the road.
- When available, use a hands-free device. If possible, add an additional layer of convenience and safety to your wireless phone with one of the many hands free accessories available today.
- Position your wireless phone within easy reach. Be able to access your wireless phone without removing your eyes from the road. If you get an incoming call at an inconvenient time, let your voice mail answer it for you.
- 4. Let the person you are speaking with know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions. Rain, sleet, snow, ice and even heavy traffic can be hazardous.
- 5. Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving. Jotting down a "to do" list or flipping through your address book takes attention away from your primary responsibility, driving safely.
- 6. Dial sensibly and assess the traffic; if possible, place calls when you are not moving or before pulling into traffic. Try to plan calls when your car will be stationary. If you need to make a call while moving, dial only a few numbers, check the road and your mirrors, then continue.
- 7. Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may be distracting. Make people you are talking with aware you are driving and suspend conversations that have the potential to divert your attention from the road
- 8. Use your wireless phone to call for help. Dial 9-1-1 or other local emergeny number in the case of fire, traffic accident or medical emergencies. Remember, it is a free call on your wireless phone!

- 9. Use your wireless phone to help others in emergencies. If you see an auto accident, crime in progress or other serious emergency where lives are in danger, call 9-1-1 or other local emergency number, as you would want others to do for you.
- 10. Call roadside assistance or a special non-emergency wireless assistance number when necessary. If you see a broken-down vehicle posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no one appears injured, or a vehicle you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency number.

Operating Environment

Remember to follow any special regulations in force in any area and always switch your phone off whenever it is forbidden to use it, or when it may cause interference or danger. When connecting the phone or any accessory to another device, read its user's quide for detailed safety instructions. Do not connect incompatible products.

As with other mobile radio transmitting equipment, users are advised that for the satisfactory operation of the equipment and for the safety of personnel, it is recommended that the equipment should only be used in the normal operating position (held to your ear with the antenna pointing over your shoulder if you are using an external antenna).

Using Your Phone Near Other Electronic Devices

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radio frequency (RF) signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals from your wireless phone. Consult the manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

Pacemakers

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum distance of 15 cm (6 inches) be maintained between a wireless phone and a pacemaker to avoid potential interference with the pacemaker.

These recommendations are consistent with the independent research and recommendations of Wireless Technology Research.

Persons with pacemakers:

- should always keep the phone more than 15 cm (6 inches) from their pacemaker when the phone is switched on.
- should not carry the phone in a breast pocket.
- should use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimize potential interference.

If you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place, switch your phone off immediately.

Hearing Aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may wish to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives

When some mobile phones are used near some hearing devices (hearing aids and cochlear implants), users may detect a buzzing, humming, or whining noise. Some hearing devices are more immune than others to this interference noise, and phones also vary in the amount of interference they generate.

The wireless telephone industry has developed ratings for some of their mobile phones, to assist hearing device users in finding phones that may be compatible with their hearing devices. Not all phones have been rated. Phones that are rated have the rating on their box or a label on the box.

The ratings are not guarantees. Results will vary depending on the user's hearing device and hearing loss. If your hearing device happens to be vulnerable to interference, you may not be able to use a rated phone successfully. Trying out the phone with your hearing device is the best way to evaluate it for your personal needs. M-Ratings: Phones rated M3 or M4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than phones that are not labeled. M4 is the better/higher of the two ratings. T-Ratings: Phones rated T3 or T4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to be more usable with a hearing device's telecoil ("T Switch" or "Telephone Switch") than unrated phones. T4 is the better/higher of the two ratings. (Note that not all hearing devices have telecoils in them.) Hearing devices may also be measured for immunity to this type of interference. Your hearing device manufacturer or hearing health professional may help you find results for your hearing device. The more immune your hearing aid is, the less likely you are to experience interference noise from mobile phones.

Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical devices, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information. Switch your phone off in health care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that could be sensitive to external RF energy.

Vehicles

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or its representative regarding your vehicle. You should also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

Posted Facilities

Switch your phone off in any facility where posted notices requireyou to do so.

Potentially Explosive Environments

Switch your phone off when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Users are advised to switch the phone off while at a refueling point (service station). Users are reminded of the need to observe restrictions on the use of radio equipment in fuel depots (fuel storage and distribution areas), chemical plants or where blasting operations are in progress.

Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often but not always clearly marked. They include below deck on boats, chemical transfer or storage facilities. vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane), areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust or metal powders, and any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine.

Emergency Calls

This phone, like any wireless phone, operates using radio signals, wireless and landline networks as well as user-programmed functions, which cannot quarantee connection in all conditions. Therefore, you should never rely solely on any wireless phone for essential communications (medical emergencies, for example).

Remember, to make or receive any calls the phone must be switched on and in a service area with adequate signal strength. Emergency calls may not be possible on all wireless phone networks or when certain network services and/or phone features are in use. Check with local service providers.

To make an emergency call:

- 1. If the phone is not on, switch it on.
- Key in the emergency number for your present location (for example, 911 or other official emergency number). Emergency numbers vary by location.
- 3. Press the kev.

If certain features are in use (call barring, for example), you may first need to deactivate those features before you can make an emergency call. Consult this document and your local cellular service provider.

When making an emergency call, remember to give all the necessary information as accurately as possible. Remember that your phone may be the only means of communication at the scene of an accident; do not cut off the call until given permission to do so.

Restricting Children's access to your Phone

Your phone is not a toy. Children should not be allowed to play with it because they could hurt themselves and others, damage the phone or make calls that increase your phone bill.

FCC Notice and Cautions

FCC Notice

The phone may cause TV or radio interference if used in close proximity to receiving equipment. The FCC can require you to stop using the phone if such interference cannot be eliminated.

Cautions

Any changes or modifications to your phone not expressly approved in this document could void your warranty for this equipment, and void your authority to operate this equipment. Only use approved batteries, antennas and chargers. The use of any unauthorized accessories may be dangerous and void the phone warranty if said accessories cause damage or a defect to the phone.

Although your phone is quite sturdy, it is a complex piece of equipment and can be broken. Avoid dropping, hitting, bending or sitting on it.

Other Important Safety Information

- Only qualified personnel should service the phone or install the phone in a vehicle. Faulty installation or service may be dangerous and may invalidate any warranty applicable to the device.
- Check regularly that all wireless phone equipment in your vehicle is mounted and operating properly.
- Do not store or carry flammable liquids, gases or explosive materials in the same compartment as the phone, its parts or accessories.
- For vehicles equipped with an air bag, remember that an air bag inflates with great force. Do not place objects, including both installed or portable wireless equipment in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If wireless equipment is improperly installed and the air bag inflates, serious injury could result.
- Switch your phone off before boarding an aircraft. The use of wireless phone in aircraft is illegal and may be dangerous to the aircraft's operation.
- Failure to observe these instructions may lead to the suspension or denial of telephone services to the offender, or legal action, or both.

Product Performance

Getting the Most Out of Your Signal Reception

The quality of each call you make or receive depends on the signal strength in your area. Your phone informs you of the current signal strength by displaying a number of bars next to the signal strength icon. The more bars displayed, the stronger the signal.

If you're inside a building, being near a window may give you better reception.

Understanding the Power Save Feature

If your phone is unable to find a signal after 15 minutes of searching, a Power Save feature is automatically activated. If your phone is active, it periodically rechecks service availability or you can check it yourself by pressing any key.

Anytime the Power Save feature is activated, a message displays on the screen. When a signal is found, your phone returns to idle mode.

Understanding How Your Phone Operates

Your phone is basically a radio transmitter and receiver. When it's turned on, it receives and transmits radio frequency (RF) signals. When you use your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level. This power can range from 0.006 watts to 0.2 watts in digital mode.

Maintaining Your Phone's Peak Performance

For the best care of your phone, only authorized personnel should service your phone and accessories. Faulty service may void the warranty.

There are several simple guidelines to operating your phone properly and maintaining safe, satisfactory service.

- If your phone is equipped with an external antenna, hold the phone with the antenna raised, fully-extended and over your shoulder.
- Do not hold, bend or twist the phone's antenna.
- . Do not use the phone if the antenna is damaged.
- If your phone is equipped with an internal antenna, obstructing the internal antenna could inhibit performance.
- . Speak directly into the phone's receiver.
- Avoid exposing your phone and accessories to rain or liquid spills. If your phone
 does get wet, immediately turn the power off and remove the battery. If it is
 inoperable, call Customer Care for service.

Availability of Various Features/Ring Tones

Many services and features are network dependent and may require additional subscription and/or usage charges. Not all features are available for purchase or use in all areas. Downloadable Ring Tones may be available at an additional cost. Other conditions and restrictions may apply. See your service provider for additional information.

Battery Standby and Talk Time

Standby and talk times will vary depending on phone usage patterns and conditions. Battery power consumption depends on factors such as network configuration, signal strength, operating temperature, features selected, frequency of calls, and voice, data, and other application usage patterns.

Battery Precautions

- Avoid dropping the cell phone. Dropping it, especially on a hard surface, can
 potentially cause damage to the phone and battery. If you suspect damage to
 the phone or battery, take it to a service center for inspection.
- · Never use any charger or battery that is damaged in any way.
- Use the battery only for its intended purpose.
- If you use the phone near the network's base station, it uses less power; talk
 and idle time are greatly affected by the signal strength on the cellular
 network and the parameters set by the network operator.

- Follow battery usage, storage and charging guidelines found in the user's auide.
- Battery charging time depends on the remaining battery charge and the type of battery and charger used. The battery can be charged and discharged hundreds of times, but it will gradually wear out. When the operation time (talk time and idle time) is noticeably shorter than normal, it is time to buy a new battery.
- If left unused, a fully charged battery will discharge itself over time.
- Use only Samsung-approved batteries and recharge your battery only with Samsung-approved chargers. When a charger is not in use, disconnect it from the power source. Do not leave the battery connected to a charger for more than a week, since overcharging may shorten its life.
- Do not use incompatible cell phone batteries and chargers. Some Web sites and second-hand dealers, not associated with reputable manufacturers and carriers, might be selling incompatible or even counterfeit batteries and chargers. Consumers should purchase manufacturer or carrier recommended products and accessories. If unsure about whether a replacement battery or charger is compatible, contact the manufacturer of the battery or charger.
- Extreme temperatures will affect the charging capacity of your battery: it may require cooling or warming first.
- Do not leave the battery in hot or cold places, such as in a car in summer or winter conditions, as you will reduce the capacity and lifetime of the battery. Always try to keep the battery at room temperature. A phone with a hot or cold battery may temporarily not work, even when the battery is fully charged. Liion batteries are particularly affected by temperatures below 0 °C (32 °F).
- Do not place the phone in areas that may get very hot, such as on or near a cooking surface, cooking appliance, iron, or radiator.
- Do not get your phone or battery wet. Even though they will dry and appear to operate normally, the circuitry could slowly corrode and pose a safety hazard.
- Do not short-circuit the battery. Accidental short- circuiting can occur when a metallic object (coin, clip or pen) causes a direct connection between the + and - terminals of the battery (metal strips on the battery), for example when you carry a spare battery in a pocket or bag. Short-circuiting the terminals may damage the battery or the object causing the short-circuiting.
- Do not permit a battery out of the phone to come in contact with metal objects. such as coins, keys or iewelry.
- Do not crush, puncture or put a high degree of pressure on the battery as this can cause an internal short-circuit, resulting in overheating.
- Dispose of used batteries in accordance with local regulations. In some areas. the disposal of batteries in household or business trash may be prohibited. For safe disposal options for Li-lon batteries, contact your nearest Samsung authorized service center. Always recycle. Do not dispose of batteries in a fire.
